

Present Perfect (Simple)







We form the present perfect tense with have / has + past participle.



I You We They	have	eaten	an apple.
He She It John	has	eaten	an apple.







- I <u>have already cooked</u> dinner.
- Have you cooked dinner yet?
- I <u>haven't cooked</u> dinner <u>yet</u>.
- Have you ever cooked lamb?
- I have never cooked lamb.
- I <u>have</u> recently <u>cooked</u> lamb.
- I have studied English since 2005.
- I <u>have studied</u> English for 8 years.



Present Perfect Continuous









- Sub + has/have + V(3)
- He has written an essay.
- Sub + has/have + not + V(3)
- He has not written an essay.



Has he written an essay.?





Typical time expressions that are used with the present perfect continuous include:

lately

for days

already



Past Simple and Past Continuous



FINISHED TIME WORD

I went to the cinema yesterday.

Use with: yesterday, last night, in 2003, 6 months ago.



DETAILS OF NEWS

I've hurt my leg. I fell off a ladder.

FINISHED TIME PERIOD

Leonardo painted the Mona Lisa.

Use with: the present perfect.

PAST SIMPLE

PRESENT / FUTURE

PAST

ACTIONS IN STORIES

He sat down and ordered a coffee.

Use with: the past continuous.

UNREAL / IMAGINARY THINGS

If I won the lottery, I would buy a house.

Use with: wish, it's time, second conditional.

Past Simple



?



TO BE

S + Was/were

They were friends.

S + was not/were not + ...

They weren't friends.

Was/Were + S + ...?

They weren't friends.

VERBS

S + V-ed

She worked yesterday.

S + did not + verb (base form)

She didn't work yesterday.

Did + S + verb (in base form)?

Did she work yesterday?

Past Continuous

OVERLAPPING ACTION

I was walking to the station when I met John.

Use with: when + past simple, two o'clock, 7pm.

STORY BACKGROUND

The birds were singing and the sun was shining. Amy sat down.

Use with: the past simple.

SOME PAST HABITS

She was constantly singing.

Use with: always, forever, constantly, at that time, in those days.

PAST CONTINUOUS

EMPHASIS OF LENGTH OF ACTION

I was working in the garden all day.

Use with: all day, all evening, for hours.










- Sub+was/were + V1(-ing)
- He was traveling to Venice.



He was not traveling to Venice.




Was he traveling to Venice?








Past Simple Tense

Past Continuous Tense





Past Perfect (Simple)

ACTION FINISHED BEFORE ANOTHER PAST ACTION

When we arrived, the film had started.

Use with: when + past simple, June, last Tuesday.



HOW LONG TO A POINT IN THE PAST

When he graduated, he had been in London for six years.

Use with: when + past simple, for + time.

PAST PERFECT

UNREAL THINGS IN THE PAST

I wish I hadn't gone to bed so late!

Use with: third conditionals, wish.





had + past participle

When do we use Past Perfect Tense?

The past perfect takes place before another past action.

Example:

I noticed that he had left his books behind.

past action

past perfect









HOW LONG TO A POINT IN THE PAST

She had been working at that company for a year when she met James.

Use with: when + past simple, for + time.

RESULT AT A TIME IN THE PAST

The pavement was wet. It had been raining.

Use with: the past simple.





S + had + been + V-ing
They had been playing tennis.

S + had not/ hadn't + been +V-ing
They hadn't been playing tennis.


? Had + S + been + V-ing?
Had they been playing tennis?






