Future time clauses

- A time clause begins with words such as *if*, before, after, as soon as, and when.
- A time clause has a subject and a verb. In the future tense, the verb in the time clause is in the **present** tense and the verb in the main clause is in the **future** tense or is a modal, such as *may* or *might*.





Examples:

After the baby finishes eating, we'll put her to bed.

You should not put her to bed until her hair has dried.

When her hair has dried, you can put her to bed.

I will wait here until they come.

Nasser must go home after he finishes his work.
