Adverbs & Adverbial Phrases

Use:

Adverbs can describe an action.

He walked slowly.

They can also **modify adjectives** or other **adverbs**.





What's an adverb?

Adverb:

- a word used for describing a verb (an action) –
 e.g., he walks slowly,
- an adjective e.g., it's incredibly expensive,
- another adverb, or a whole sentence he works very hard..
- Adverbs in English often consist of an adjective with "-ly" added, for example "quickly", "mainly," and "cheerfully."







An adverb describes a verb, an adjective or another adverb.

It tells us how, where, when, how much and with what frequency.

An adverb can tel...

- She walks to school every day.
