"Phrasal verbs 2"

A **phrasal verb** is a **verb** that is made up of a main **verb** together with an adverb or a preposition, or both. Typically, their meaning is not obvious from the meanings of the individual words themselves.

For example:


- 1. I'll see to the animals.
