So and Such

Too and Enough





Such is a determiner; *so* is an adverb. They often have the same meaning of ‘very’ or ‘to this degree’:

Those are good chocolates.

Those chocolates are good.

We use *such* + noun phrase and *so* + adjective or adverb phrase:

She is a great cook.

Not: She is so great cook.

That was unpleasant. (so + adjective)

Not: That was such unpleasant.

Why do you drive fast? (so + adverb)

Not: Why do you drive such fast?



Compare

so + adjective

such + noun phrase

You're **so** kind.

He's **such** a kind person

It was **so** hot we couldn't work.

November was **such** a cold month.



TOO

👉 We use “**too**” to mean *more than sufficient* or *more/less than necessary*:

Too + adjective:

E.g. *It's too late to stop him.*

Jerry was too young to watch the movie.

Too many + countable noun

E.g. *There are too many people on this train, there's nowhere to sit.*

ENOUGH

👉 We use “**enough**” to mean *sufficient*:

Adjective + enough:

E.g. *Your clothes are big enough to fit me.*

Verb + enough:

E.g. *You've done enough work. You can stop now.*

Enough + noun (countable or uncountable)

E.g. *Have you got enough money to buy me a drink?*





TOO / ENOUGH

TOO + ADJECTIVE/ADVERB

EXCESSIVE (more than
necessary)

This jacket is too expensive. I'm not going to buy it. No way!

It's too cold **to go** swimming. Let's go to the cinema instead.

The test was too difficult. I don't think I'll pass.

You are too young **to go** to a disco.
You must be 18 to get in.

Come on! You are too old **to ride** the Merry-Go-Round.

ADJECTIVE/ADVERB + ENOUGH

SUFFICIENT

You are not working hard enough. If you don't study more, you won't pass your tests.

He is not tall enough **to be** in the basketball team.

I will never be rich enough **to buy** that house.

Come on! You are not small enough **to get through** that hole. You will never reach the other side.
