Topic 60: Direct and indirect objects



An **object** is the part of a sentence that gives meaning to the subject's action of the verb.

For example: Alice caught the baseball. Subject=Alice Verb=caught Object=baseball

A direct object answers the question of who(m) or what.

In the sentence above, you could determine that 'baseball' is a direct object by asking the question: What did Alice catch? She caught the baseball. Baseball is the direct object.





An **indirect object** answers the question of to whom, for whom, or for what. **For example:** Max pitched Alice the baseball.

Max (subject) pitched (verb) the baseball (direct object) to whom? He pitched it to Alice. Alice is the indirect object.
